

LOCAL FRST Fork Fest 2016

o you have dinner plans October 20? Cancel them and work up an appetite for Local First's 6th annual Fork Fest. Dozens of local restaurants, farms and bakeries set a table at Romence Gardens & Greenhouses, inviting you to indulge in menu item favorites and introduce your taste buds to new concoctions.

"It's really about connecting people with their food," Local First Marketing Manager Mieke Stoub said. "[Food is] a communal thing and we like to bring the community together."

The "If you cook it, they will come" basis of Fork Fest is inarguably solid, but the Local First team is consistently brainstorming changes they can make to strengthen the relationship between community members and our food sources. Heffron Farms offers a taste of their products that are adored for being free of growth hormones, preservatives, dyes and antibiotics. West Michigan Growers Group, a local farm collective, is also joining the mix of restaurants and bakeries to give people a taste of the best crops and produce of the season.

Local First's intention is to educate the public on the importance of creating and maintaining a sustainable community, and Fork Fest offers people a first-hand opportunity to connect with the primal local food sources in our community. By supporting local businesses, we fuel our economy and, in turn, receive quality ingredients that aren't questionably disguised in Styrofoam and plastic cases.

Fork Fest 2016 further bridges the understanding of the food-making process by including a butchering demonstration by Louise Earl Butcher. Attendees can watch owner Matt Smith as he shows the start-to-finish process of making pork chops and loins with meat sourced from a local farm.

Adult beverages provided by Brewery Vivant, Fenn Valley Vineyards and Vander Mill Cider serve sips between the nibbles. Beer lovers are reunited with Pumpkin Tart saison and two other Vivant favorites. Choices of red and white wine and Vander Mill's prime cider flavors grace the bar table as well. Ages 21 and over can purchase drink tickets for \$6 at the entrance. Non-alcoholic beverages are also available at no extra charge.

Prepare for the feast of a lifetime by indulging in the opportunity to taste unlimited samples from the restaurants, bakeries and farms that play the critical part in the enviable food culture of Grand Rapids.
